

Message from Fr. David

St. Thérèse of Lisieux

Oct. 1 would normally be the feast of St. Thérèse of Lisieux, but unfortunately her feast has been preempted by Sunday this year. Sunday taking precedence is a great reminder of how important the celebration of the Resurrection is in our lives, but it's also sad that we do not get to celebrate St. Thérèse. So, here is some info about St. Thérèse:

She was born in France in 1873. Her parents (who are now canonized as well), both wanted to be in the consecrated life, so they told their priest they were going to live a celibate marriage. The priest said hat's not how God intended marriage to work, and they took that to heart, having 9 children.

The family was close, especially after loosing their mom to breast cancer, and later on when 3 of the daughters were in the convent, their dad to mental instability due to strokes.

St. Thérèse wanted nothing more than to enter the convent from a very young age. When she was 14, she kept asking the various authorities if she could enter religious life early. She even went to the Pope and was carried out by the Swiss Guards. She made an impression, obviously, and was eventually allowed to join early. In the convent she went through much introspection and sadness, but eventually came to give us some of the most memorable spiritual statements our Church has ever heard:



First her little way: "We live in an age of inventions (elevators). We need no longer climb laboriously up flights of stairs; in well-to-do houses there are lifts. And I was determined to find a lift to

carry me to Jesus, for I was far too small to climb the steep stairs of perfection. So I sought in holy Scripture some idea of what this life I wanted would be, and I read these words:
'Whosoever is a little one, come to me.' It is your arms, Jesus, that are the lift to carry me to heaven. And so there is no need for me to grow up: I must stay little and become less and less."

And her vocation to love: I feel in me the vocation of the Priest. I have the vocation of the Apostle. Martyrdom was the dream of my youth and this dream has grown with me. Considering the mystical body of the Church, I desired to see myself in them all. Charity gave me the key to my vocation. I understood that the Church had a Heart and that this Heart was burning with love. I understood that Love comprised all vocations, that Love was everything, that it embraced all times and places...in a word, that it was eternal! Then in the excess of my delirious joy, I cried out: O Jesus, my Love...my vocation, at last I have found it...My vocation is Love!"

You can read her words through her autobiography: Story of a Soul. She also featured in many popular spiritual books such as 33 Days to Morning Glory, Consoling the Heart of Jesus, and I Believe in Love. She is the Patron Saint of Missions even though she did not leave the convent and died at the age of 24. The missionaries throughout the world insisted on this because of how she inspired them to allow love to influence all of their work. St. Thérèse of Lisieux, Pray for us!
